Umpires' Corner

A player stands on the mat with the toes of both feet 20cm over the front of the mat and delivers his bowl. Is he footfaulting?

Yes. Law 20.1. Before delivery a player should be standing on the mat with one foot fully on the mat.

During a singles game a bowl in course from the next rink comes toward the head. The marker lifts the stationary bowl to allow it to pass. Is the marker correct?

No. Law 28.6.2. If, during a singles game, a bowl at rest on the rink is in danger of being moved by a bowl from a neighbouring rink, the marker should stop the bowl from the neighbouring rink.

A Lead delivered the jack and played the first bowl. The opposing lead then queried the length of the roll of the jack. What shall happen?

Nothing . Law 22.7. After the first player has delivered the first bowl, no one has the right to challenge the legality of the original position of the jack.

A jack in course is displaced by the opposing skip. What shall happen?

Law 33.1.1.2. If a jack in its original course is displaced by an opponent, it should be delivered by the same player.

Who is the player in possession of the rink?

Law 35.1. Possession of the rink will belong to the player or team whose bowl is being played.

Ask the umpire.

Profiles

Kevin Ross

Kevin Ross was born on the 1st April, 1940 (no, it wasn't an April Fools Joke) at Marrickville, the eldest of four boys. His schooling began at West Marrickville and he then went to Dulwich Hill Junior Tech High School. He always wanted to be a butcher, so at the age of 10, he worked in a Butcher's Shop after school, delivering orders etc. After completing his Intermediate Certificate at age 15, he left school and went straight into butchering, doing his 5 year apprenticeship at the same shop. There was no TAFE in those days, it was all practical. At the end of his apprenticeship, Kevin decided to branch out and extend his knowledge at various other shops. His working career included owning several butcher shops and later working as a representative selling butcher's supplies.

In 1988 Kevin and a working partner purchased a Butcher Supply Company at Warriewood which also manufactured sausage seasonings, meat coatings and marinades. After building the business up, he was unfortunately forced to retire in 2002 due to heart problems.

In 1962, Kevin was married and a year later he and his wife had a daughter, Debbie. In 1965, his wife contracted Hodgkins Disease, a form of cancer, and died later that year, aged 25. This was a difficult time and they both lived with his parents who cared for Debbie for many years.

In 1970, through mutual friends, Kevin met Belle and they were married in 1972 with Debbie aged 8 being the flower girl. Debbie is now 50 and both she and Belle share a very close relationship. Kevin and Belle went on to have two more daughters, Sarah-Jane and Anita and now enjoy eight grandchildren, 4 boys and 4 girls.

Kevin started playing bowls in 1967 with his father and uncle at Revesby Bowling Club and later joined the Hunters Hill Bowling Club where he won the Club Minor Singles Championship in 1971. In 1973, Kevin joined the small West Pennant Hills Bowling Club which at that time was supported by dedicated volunteers, working behind the scenes at the bar etc. It was during this time that he became friendly with Don Fletcher, Bob Rosebery and Barry Walker with whom he had many a good game of bowls. In the late 80's and early 90's Kev took a few years off playing bowls to concentrate on his business which required long working hours often including weekends. In 2007, Kevin left

WPH and joined the Hills Bowling Club for a period of 5 years and has recently rejoined WPH Bowling Club to meet up again with many good friends and new bowlers.

Wendy Wise

Wendy was born at Croydon Park NSW on 27th January 1942, an only child. She lived in Ashfield until she married Ross Wise in 1964. Wendy attended Ashfield Primary School and then Burwood Girls High School. After leaving school she attended Sydney Technical College where she studied a Business Principles Course, learning shorthand and typing. In 1958 she started work for a firm of solicitors, "Walker, Taylor, Edwards and Smith" in Castlereagh Street, Sydney.

After her marriage she moved from Ashfield to Beecroft and is still living in the same home after 49 years. Wendy has two sons and four granddaughters.

Wendy played tennis in Western Suburbs for many years and after moving to Beecroft played at Cheltenham in the Eastwood Thornleigh Tennis Association. She worked on the Grading Committee of that Association for a couple of years as a Delegate and then became involved with the Delegates Grading Committee of the Metropolitan Grass Courts Association at White City. After a number of years as Delegate she became the Chairperson. While involved as a Delegate she helped with the running of the "Esso" Girls and Boys age championships.

Wendy joined the bowling section of Cheltenham in 1986. Even though she was playing bowls she was still involved with tennis, being a foundation member of the Friends of the NSW Tennis Association which ran the Tennis Museum at White City and then at Homebush Park. Wendy was a volunteer at the Museum for about 16 years and during that time was a member of the Committee.

When she started to play bowls full time she held positions on the Committee as Treasurer, Vice President and President. Both her husband, Ross, and Wendy were Presidents of the bowling club at the same time. While she was President Wendy became involved with the Northern Suburbs District Women's Bowling Association where she held the positions of Match Committee member, Publicity Officer, Delegate to the NSW Women's Bowling Association, Vice President and President. At the moment Wendy holds the position of Selector on the Selection Committee.

She left Cheltenham Bowling Club in 2007 after her husband passed away and joined West Epping Panthers WBC and remained a member until the club was closed by the Panthers Group in 2011. Wendy then joined the Women's Bowling Section at West Pennant Hills.

Wendy enjoys playing competitive bowls and has been successful over the years both at Club level and District level. She is enjoying her bowls at West Pennant Hills and has made many lovely friends.
